## A Message from Andrew Freer, our Ringing Master

There's not much to report this month as we haven't had a Branch Practice. However, I had a welcome surprise last Saturday, while out for a walk with my parents, when we chanced across the Grandsire group of the Radley Course ringing up at Horspath. I was invited in for a touch before we went on our way. I do recommend anyone signing up for a course like this because you get a whole day of practice with strong bands who are determined to help you. Did anyone reading this go on the Radley course? I'm sure Paul would be happy to print any tips you picked up, if so.

## Simulators - How do you use yours?

More and more towers have been getting simulators recently, so it seems like a good idea to share some ideas on how to take full advantage of them. We can collect them here, and then Andy Dunn, who is the Webmaster for the Oxford City Branch, has suggested putting the collected ideas on to the website. To start us off, here are some ways I use simulators:

## Individual handling practice

Learners who start with tied bells can be surprised by the gap between pulling a stroke and it sounding. The simplest use of the simulator that I know is just to have the bell sound while practising handling.

## Listening to your striking

Set Abel to autostart in rounds and have an instructor start ringing. Ask the learners to say which bell the instructor is ringing. By clicking on a rope you can change which simulated bell corresponds to the tied bell and ask again. Have the instructor simulate some consistent striking faults and ask the learners to diagnose the faults.

## Abingdon Bell Ringers win a National Award

Abingdon Society of Bell Ringers has won the prestigious Sarah Beacham Youth Group Award, from the Association of Ringing Teachers (ART).


They were presented with the $£ 400$ prize at the ART conference in Basingstoke on Saturday $11^{\text {th }}$ March.
The Abingdon Society of Bell Ringers is the group which ring the tower bells of St Helen and St Nicolas churches every week. Over the last six years the ringers have been encouraging young people to join them, holding special weekly practices and courses during some of the school holidays. They also organise social activities and outings for all the young ringers in the area.
As a result there is now a thriving group of young ringers in and around Abingdon. Of the young ringers in last year's National Youth Contest representing the Oxford Diocesan Guild, half were from Abingdon - and they came joint second.Other young ringers from Abingdon have gone on to leading roles elsewhere. David Thomas (19) who recently started at Liverpool
 University, has become not only an eminent ringer at Liverpool Cathedral, but is Master of the Liverpool Universities Society of Change Ringers. Similarly, a few years ago Catriona Shearer became Master of Cambridge University Guild of Change Ringers and now co-ordinates young ringer events in the Ely Diocese.As well as providing a graded scheme for learning to ring, the Association of Ringing Teachers has developed resources for training and accrediting teachers of ringing. Abingdon now has two qualified and several partly qualified ringing teachers.
The Abingdon ringers plan to put the prize towards a 'dumb bell'. This will allow ringers to practise ringing on their own with a computer and hone their timing skills - useful as the weekly Friday practices are so well attended.

## Update on the Cuddesdon Bells And finally.... after 447 years....!

The six bells at All Saints, Cuddesdon, are due to be rehung in a repaired bell frame later this year,
 and $£ 68,000$ has been raised thus far to cover the cost of this exciting plan, so that they will ring out again after many years of silence - a remarkable achievement....
But what is also even more remarkable is the fact that the treble bell, (that is to say, the lightest at 5 cwt.) was due to be recast as a part of the project... but nobody could foresee when this was envisaged that it was destined to be among the very, very last of the bells cast at the world famous Whitechapel Bell Foundry.... on Wednesday $22^{\text {nd }}$ March, 2017.... the last day casting took place!
Founded in 1570, Whitechapel is the oldest manufacturing company in the country, and has been casting bells there for 447 years! Sadly, the Foundry premises have now been sold, and as yet we do not know where subsequent bells will be cast - so All Saints, Cuddesdon's new treble bell will be among the very last, and proud descendant of such famous bells as.... Big Ben in London and the
 Liberty Bell in New York! Brian Lowe

## A Trip to the Vale of the White Horse

The Vale of the White Horse was at its picturesque best for our outing to three of its eight-bell towers, Childrey, Longcot and Faringdon.


A prodigious turnout meant that we were able to ring Triples and Major exclusively throughout the day and great credit is due to Donna Bennett for not only booking the towers and the pub, but for also ensuring the splendid level of attendance.
It was seventeen years since we last had an outing to these towers, just prior to Childrey bells being augmented to an eight. Lunch was taken at The King and Queen in Longcot which is a pub with decided ambience even if its narrative is primarily more recent rather than historic.


Whilst enjoying the excellent food in this well frequented pub it was hard to believe that this is a pub which was one of the
 early casualties in the wave of pub closures during the past decade or so. Such was the promptness of service there was time in hand for a frame of bar billiards to be played between Paul and Neil (and an audience to gather) before heading off to Faringdon for some Single Oxford Triples among other methods.

Outing to Shropshire, Herefordshire and Powys - Saturday 1 st April


In all honesty it is not something that I have ever kept record of, but I would say that it is a safe bet to conclude that I have never been on an outing where all the locations possess, or once possessed, castles. Stokesay and Ludlow still notably boast castles of stunning diversity yet equal interest, both historically and aesthetically. Ludlow
 is the epitome of a market town, with a street market held most days of the week, and 500 listed buildings within its boundaries. The spiral staircase up to the ringing chamber contains some 150 steps, but the ten bells here are worth the exertion. What most of the other locations during the day lacked in enduring castles they made up for with excellent bells. Richards Castle church is something of a grandiose Victorian anachronism with one 41 cwt bell (the largest in the Diocese) that has a rope thicker than the norm and two sallies to ring it by. It was wonderful to travel with Anne and Rupert from Eynsham tower who have come on several City Branch outings in recent years. Andrew Goldthorpe from Witney took a good video of the bells ringing at Ludlow. Our thanks are due to John Hearn for organizing such an ambitious itinerary. Hugh Deam
