## Headington Ringers Trip to Nottingham on Saturday 22nd April

Last year, two Headington ringers, Ed Nicholson and Matt Beardsall both moved back to their native c During that time, they both became active members of the St Andrew's band in Headington, as well as taking part in ringing around the city. After they left, we had always planned to take a trip to Nottingham for a ringing reunion! And so it came to pass that on $22^{\text {nd }}$ April, on $a$ beautiful spring day, 14 ringers -7 from Headington, along with a mix of other ringers from St Giles, Kidlington, Woodstock, Marston and Aylesbury, plus some local Nottingham ringers, all met up at the first of the churches Attenborough (8) (11cwt), just outside the city. This was Matt's home tower where he learnt to ring, and was the start of our reunion, where we caught up with each other's news!
After Attenborough, we boarded one of the excellent new trams into the city centre to ring on the beautiful 12 bells at St Peter's Church (22cwt). Just before 12noon, we all stopped ringing, so that we could go out on to the roof to listen to the majestic sound of 'Little John' - the 10 ton bell at Nottingham Town Hall (left), better known as 'The Council House', striking midday!
This magnificent bell is reputed to be the deepest toned bell in the world! Well worth listening to!
Then it was off to The Roebuck, one the local Weatherspoons in Nottingham, for an extremely
 pleasant pub lunch!
After that, it was back on the trams to head off to the University Tower of All Saints (10) (16cwt) yet more excellent bells! And our final destination was Beeston (10) (17cwt), where we rounded off our day.

Our thanks must go to Ed and Matt for organizing such a brilliant tour of the towers of Nottingham, which was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone who came along!

## Young Peoples Ringing Outing

## Old North Berks Branch - Great Milton \& Great Haseley on Wednesday19 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ April

It was a beautiful sunny day in the Easter Holidays (as decreed by Oxfordshire County Council). The young ringers were missing some of the
 usual faces: At least one group couldn't come because their school had become an academy and opted to set their own different holidays. And others were on holiday with their families. But we had eleven school aged ringers including three from the Reading Branch and eight from the Old North Berks Branch. Ages ranged from 11 to 18 years old. And we were accompanied by seven adult ringers and one little brother.
We met at the church in Great Milton and rang on the lovely eight with David Thomas (19) taking charge. We rang lots of rounds and call changes as well as some plain bob triples among other methods. At the end of the ringing we arranged the young ringers into three teams to compete in a treasure hunt on our way by foot to Great Haseley, less than two miles away. Each group was
 accompanied by two adults and Daphne
 Pollard went ahead by car to open the Village Hall and arrange the refreshments. One of the questions invited the teams to sketch a prominent local landmark. Luckily they all spotted the nearby windmill and Isaac O'Shea was keen to tell everyone that his granddad had helped to build it! They mostly identified the winter crop near the path as Christmas Trees (but one group guessed it was winter barley!) They must have been hungry that day - all the cakes and scones that Daphne provided were eaten!
And then we walked on to the church at Great Haseley where Hilarie Rogers met us. Half way up the tower there was a small opening between the stones used to build the tower where there must have been a bee's nest as hundreds of small bees were streaming in and out.
We climbed the steps (being careful of the wobbly one) and rang on the lovely six bells. We even rang a couple of tunes - "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star" and "Now the day is over".
It was sad to hear that there is no local band of ringers to ring on those bells.
We were told not to open the ringing room window in case the bees came in the ringing chamber. And that was good advice because whilst we rang, an enormous cloud of bees gathered excitedly in the sunshine outside the tower window and then swept away. Perhaps they were swarming on that warm afternoon.
Before we dispersed, the results of the Treasure Hunt were announced. Two teams were joint winners and received a bag of mini Easter Eggs each to share out.
