Mystery Solved! Richard Bennett's 'Mystery' Outing.

There have been ringing outings where the destinations are known in advance that could be described as inverted mystery outings as they give



leave to be mystified as to whether it was all worth it, but Saturday's mystery outing something to be glad one came along to, thanks to the organisational skills of Richard Bennett, who also did the driving of the minibus. The clue 'airfields' was no red herring as all four Gloucestershire towers were located in villages with historic RAF connections.

From the lesser known airfields of South Cerney and Rendcomb we moved to Kemble, famous for having

been the home to the Red Arrows display team for nearly twenty years, and concluded at Fairford which was the base for the Concorde during its trialling in the 1970s.

After the first three beneficent sets of bells to ring, all thoughts turned to Fairford bells which are rung from the chancel crossing, a rare positioning that can pose extra questions in regard to bell-handling, but as it turned out they were kind in disposition, plus the church boasts the most complete surviving set of medieval stained glass in the country. All Saints, Cuddesdon bells come out... mostly!

With the scaffolding up, Whites of Appleton began removing the six bells on the 17th October, lowering the treble first through the tortuous route from the belfry, through a previously blocked doorway, down the back of the organ and out into the north



side of the nave. The plan was to remove all six bells by Wednesday 18th when they were to be lined up for

everyone to see. However, only the first four were on show in the evening when parishioners were invited to the church to see them; the fifth and tenor remained aloft until the next day. The fifth





descended and joined the other bells, and it remained for the tenor to be extracted.... but on reaching the last stage of lowering behind the organ, it was found that the bell was slightly too large for the aperture provided by the scaffolding! Only two options would provide a solution: to adjust the scaffolding, or to remove the canon. In the event, the former would have taken too long, so the latter was to be the course of action.... but this needed Diocesan Advisory Committee sanction, and the time ran out. So at the time of writing it is hoped that the Tenor (Whitechapel, 1863) will receive this permission, and will reach its companions for transport to Appleton around Wednesday this coming week. Then the present, porous, Treble will be disposed of for scrap and the new bell cast this year, will join the ring, and be back in the belfry early next year. **Brian Lowe**

Isaac O'Shea's Muffles

The first lot of muffles I made were of great success. So much so that Tim Pett highly recommended we replace our ten year old Whitechapel set at Abingdon St Helen with a new set to my design, as not one has slipped round, thus eliminating the need for tape or anti-slip paint. They also sound better than what Whitechapel supplied, so I was wondering if you could please circulate my new advert around please?




O'Shea Velcro Bell Muffles

Bell muffles made from high quality Cow Hide leather and crafted with great precision made to match clappers. Made using traditional leather working techniques such as wet moulding and riveting combined with a small amount of adhesive to aid durability and treated with leather preservative to lock in moisture and protect against dampness for a long serving life.

High quality copper rivets are used for attaching the muffle neck to the main body

On bells heavier then 6cwt, rivets are used in conjunction with the adhesive on the central pad.



Required dimensions are:

A. Shaft Diameter

peal of Plain Bob Major on the hand bells before the evening service.

- B. Ball diameter
- C Diameter where ball meets flight
- D. Length of flight

Bells up to 12cwt £15 each

Above 13cwt £22 each

Timber shafts £32 each

Nylon shafts £26 each
