Bell Restoration Appeal for St Mary the Virgin (6), Oxford (27cwt).

Recent examination of the bells and their fittings by Whites have found that the bells are in urgent need of repair. The headstocks of the front five bells are made of elm and have splits in them; all are distorted and twisted, taking the bearings out of alignment. The bearings of the front five bells revolve in plain brass housings which are extremely worn and corroded and one of the pivots of the fourth bell has cracked rendering this bell unringable since 2009. The bell wheels are in poor condition and the rims are now starting to degrade. The pulley wheels are heavily worn. The bell frame is sound but needs to be cleaned, de-rusted and repainted. The bells are sound, but require turning due to heavy wear in the soundbow areas where the clappers strike. The proposed work is that the bells will be rehung with new fittings in the existing oak and cast iron frame which will be cleaned and repainted. Bells one to five will be turned and hung on cast iron headstocks with new bearings. The Tenor bell will be turned and rehung on its refurbished cast iron headstock and bearing housings. All the bells will have new hardwood wheels, hardwood pulley units, ash stays, sliders and hardwood runner boards. New hardwood floor rope bosses and anodised aluminium ceiling rope bosses will be installed. The total cost of the project will be around £30,000 which the Oxford Society of Change Ringers and the Oxford University Society of Change Ringers have jointly undertaken to raise, and the work will be carried out by Whites.
