Our voyage to the 'lost' village of Imber! St Giles Church (6) 2cwt - Friday 6th April.

Imber is first mentioned in a charter of 967AD and was always a remote village even before the military began to take occupation of Salisbury Plain at the end of the 19th century. By the 1930s the army had taken possession of the majority of land hereabouts. The urgent need for locations mirroring the villages of Normandy prior to D-Day led to Imber being evacuated for American troops to train for such close-quarter combat conditions. Promises to villagers that they would be able to return to Imber after the war.

The church was placed in the hands of the Church Conservation Trust in recent years with the current ring of six bells installed in 2009. Two dozen ringers converged on the excellent Bridge Inn in West Lavington at lunchtime prior to our proceeding in convoy to the church amidst the MOD land that is usually only traversed by tanks or armoured vehicles.
