A Ringing Practice at Chipping Norton (8)

Continuing our run of visiting towers relatively close to Oxford where surprisingly few of us have ever rung, or at least cannot recall for certain having rung at, our destination was Oxfordshire's highest situated town, namely **Chipping Norton**. We were in some ways grateful for the weather being somewhat less





than glorious as it clearly kept the expected level of traffic down on the roads, with the CLA Game Fair taking place in Woodstock, directly on the obvious route to *Chippy'*. The gloomy forecast seemingly also deferred some of the Saturday shopping crowd, thus making it easier to find a parking space. Thankfully there was nothing subdued about the ringing, with a really healthy turnout,

especially as this was the start of the famed 'Great Summer Getaway'. Just to the west of the bustling High Street and its Saturday market is the primarily 15th century church, with adjoining earthworks being the only reminder of the castle that once stood adjacent. 
