



St. Peter's church King's Sutton boasts one of the most magnificent spires of any parish church in the country, rising to a height of nigh on 200ft, and completes the triumvirate of mighty towers that stretch in a straight line from Bloxham in the



west, across to Adderbury and over the county border to here. Although the church in Brackley has no spire, the 13th century west tower is furnished on its exterior with some fine niches of seated figures. Both towers possess

bells that gave everyone a fair chance to burnish their triples and major ringing, whether it be inside or trebling. Instead of decamping to a pub for lunch we went to 'Rachel's Farm Shop' where most of what is on the menu is sourced from their long-established farm. Hugh Deam

'First Peal 2015'

The Central Council is supporting a nation-wide plan called 'First Peal 2015', with the aim to get 300 ringers through their first peal this year (double the usual number). It's not too soon to start thinking about who we could encourage to ring their first peal. FirstPeal2015 is a yearlong initiative to mark a special year for ringing. It has three aims:

- As many ringers as possible to ring their first peal during the year.
- A lot of special ringing to mark the anniversary, on or near 2nd May.
- A concerted publicity effort to tell the public about the heritage skills and cultural importance of bell ringing.

The peal on 2nd May 1715 at **St Peter Mancroft, Norwich (12)** was a landmark event during a period when ringers were making great progress. The previous century had seen change ringing develop to the point that many of the concepts and terminology familiar to modern ringers were already in place. Ringers had devised new methods, and they had moved to ringing on progressively higher numbers of bells. At each stage they placed great emphasis on finding ways to ring every possible row (sequence) without repetition - what we now call an extent but which they called a 'complete peal'. It would be very satisfying for The City Branch to contribute to this landmark year and so please contact me if you would like to rise to the challenge! Katie Lane
