
Alan Coates

We've just received some unfortunate news from Sydney concerning our friend and regular visitor to Oxford, Alan Coates. On the 23rd April he had a heart attack while ringing at St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney. Thankfully, because he was given CPR very quickly by two of the ringers who were with him, they actually saved his life. He had to be lowered down through the trap door in the tower by the Paramedics and Fire Service, and he was immediately taken to St Vincent's Hospital in Sydney. His wife Marylon was there when this happened, and thankfully he has now made a good recovery. This was the second time that Alan has had a heart attack. He had had another one in 2001. I recently rang with Alan when I was in



Sydney, and he seemed in the best of health, so you can imagine what a shock it was for me to receive this news last week. I'm sure I speak for all the people who know Alan from his regular visits to Oxford, that we

hope he maintains a speedy recovery. He was due to visit Oxford in June, and Hugh had arranged for him to ring a number of times while he was with us. We all hope he will be able to come back to the UK again soon when he's made a full recovery. Paul Lucas

Towards better striking: Part II

How Can You Hear Each Change? There should be a gap at backstroke which marks the end of each backstroke change. Always listen for this and note it. When ringing on odd numbers, e.g. Grandsire Doubles, the heaviest bell with the lowest and often loudest note, the tenor, always rings last and therefore marks the end of each change. If the ringing becomes confused, or you yourself become confused, you may need to look at the ropes to see the end of the change, which occurs when all the ropes have come down at one stroke. You must always know when each change begins. Make a habit of listening to the sixes in doubles and minor or eights in major or triples and count the 6-beat or 8-beat to yourself. Do this when you are ringing and when you are sitting out so that it becomes second nature. Katie Lane

There are three seats left available on a 9-seater VW Shuttle that has been booked.

Here are the two routes people can take.

From the M4, either take the Exit and junction 17 (via Bradford on Avon, easier) or Junction 18 (via Bath, more fiddly)

From Junction 17, take the **A350** towards Chippenham, but stay on the A350 until the 5th roundabout, when you take the **A4** (Bath road) towards Corsham and Bath. Stay on the A4 through Corsham and two roundabouts, but just after the second roundabout, bear left to go on Bradford road, **B3109**. Stay on the B3109 until you get to Bradford on Avon. You will pass 3 roundabouts, Take the 3rd exit, first exit and then 2nd exit. Then you will be back on the **B3109**, now Frome road. Go over the bridge, past the railway and out of Bradford on Avon. At the cross roads, take a right onto the **A366** towards Farleigh Hungerford and Norton St Philip. Stay on the A366 through those towns (you will have to turn left onto the **A36** for a short while, and then right back on to the A266). A while later turn right onto Frome Road, **A362**. In Radstock take the 1st exit at both roundabouts to get onto **Fortescue Road**, which turns into **Church Road**. The Church is on the right.

From Junction 18, Take the **A46** towards Bath. At the roundabout take the 3rd exit onto **A420**, and then turn left onto **Freezing Hill Lane**. When you get into Bath there are a variety of ways, and it might depend on the traffic at that time, but you want to leave Bath on the Wells road, **A367** towards Peasdown St John. Stay on the A367 round Peasdown St John until you get into Radstock. In Radstock there are two roundabouts. Stay on the A367 to the second one, then take the first exit - **Fortescue Road**, which turns into **Church road**. You will find the church on your right. **Heather**
