Well done Isaac for noticing this – his maintenance courses have obviously paid off. The session gave us the opportunity to ring plain courses and touches of Bob Minor and Stedman, depending on our previous experienced ringers in our home towers to practice these methods regularly, or at all. Having not rung at **Horspath** for nearly two years, I had forgotten just how lovely to ring these bells are, and they certainly aided my progress. I think it's fair to say that all of us learners would like to pass on a huge thank you to all the experienced ringers who turn out for events like this and help us to progress. *Lindsay Powell*

The ringing on Monday will probably be a quarter-peal attempt, but the Tuesday session would be intended for learners, so anyone would be welcome to take part if they have begun to learn to ring changes two-in-hand, or even any who would like to take this chance to start learning. *John Pusey*

How can you hear your own bell?

Always try to listen to your own bell, however hard it may seem. Some fortunate people have perfect pitch and can recognize the actual note of their own bell amongst all the other bells. What a gift! But most of us can't do this. So, it is necessary to pay attention on the part of the change where you know you should be, and work out a way of knowing which dong is likely to be yours. It is easier to hear your own bell in certain positions, so listen to your own bell: 1. at the lead; 2. at the back.

Less easily you should be able to hear yourself. 1. At the lead-plus-one; 2. At the back-minus-one

It is also easier to hear your bell if you are ringing the Treble or the Tenor, because yours is the highest or lowest note in the change.

Some ringers can hear their bell by listening to the musical interval between their bell and the one they are following. But it all needs practice so keep trying and at some point on a practice evening forget method ringing and FOCUS on EVERYONE putting their bell in the right place! Listen to every change. Listen to backstokes as well as handstrokes. Listen to the rounds. *Katie Lane*
