day, but this in no way had a noticeable effect on the excellent standard of bells that we encountered. At the intermediate stage of a sunny, but still winter






Coming up next month..... Colin's Spring Outing to the North Cotswolds – Saturday 2nd April – not to be missed!

Our spring outing to the North Cotswolds starts at Chipping Campden, a small medieval wool town with a notable market hall in its main street, surrounded by limestone buildings. The spacious St James church has 8 splendid bells (22cwt) and houses one of the largest brasses in England. SS Peter and Paul in Blockley is another 8 bell (16cwt) tower and this year has plans to expand to ten bells. After lunch in the café in Blockley we will visit two pleasant six bell towers - St Lawrence (11cwt) at **Bourton-on-the-Hill** and SS Peter & Paul (12cwt) in **Long Compton**.

All towers have easy to ring bells, but get a good night's sleep the night before as the heaviest bells are in **Chipping Campden**. Those who like their bell ringing, in spectacular countryside, and with many historic features, are in for a delightful day. All are welcome. Names to Hugh or Colin.
