## Witney & Woodstock Branch Outing to Gloucestershire - Saturday 15th October

The thumbnail sketches of the Cotswolds, primarily for tourist consumption, generally concentrate on the tracts of land either side of the A40,



more often than not venturing only as far south as Cirencester to illuminate upon, but indisputedly there is plenty of Cotswold majesty to he discovered in and around the Stroud Valley. This is an area which has much in common with the Royal Forest of Dean on the far west of Gloucestershire, with it being true to say that the formative influence of the wool trade is evident, but the later industrial heritage is unmistakeable. The common

land that surrounds Minchinhampton is now managed by the National Trust, with medieval rights






to graze cattle and for horses to roam under structured management. The tower of Minchinhampton church is made that more memorable due to its' broach original spire having been removed in the late 16<sup>th</sup> century and replaced by a crenellated coronet with crocketed pinnacles. The first sight of the bell-ropes adorning the chancel crossing in Leonard Stanley church might give a novice ringer a touch of the collywobbles. but

excellent guiding makes ringing a rewarding experience on wonderful bells which were not rung for the greater part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Affectionately known as the 'Queen of the Cotswolds', Painswick not only provided our lunch







venue at the 16<sup>th</sup> century hostelry, **The Falcon Inn**, but also our twelve-bell tower across the road in the classic Perpendicular church of St. Mary. The quality of the bells at the final two towers (**Bisley** and **Watermoor** in Cirencester) easily kept up the high standard for the day. This area is nowadays most widely known for being the setting for Laurie Lee's semi-autobiographical novel 'Cider With Rosie', which was the first part (and undoubtedly the most famous part) of a trilogy, and given how uniformly good the bells were there could easily be a trilogy of outings to other towers bordering the Slad Valley.
