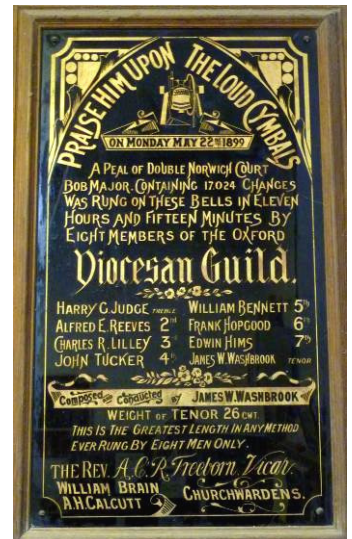
The Longest Peal of Bells

Many years ago I read with disbelief about a band of eight bell ringers, including Lord Peter Wimsey, who completed a peal of bells of over 9 hours duration. This was at Fenchurch St Pauls Church in the Fens on

New Year's Eve and it was fiction*. But last month when I was in a tower watching the shortest of rings - a striking competition - I saw these words on a Peal Board: "This is the greatest length of any method ever rung by eight men only". Not a fictional tale, but ringers at St Mary the Virgin Kidlington, Oxford. The date on the Peal Board is 22nd May 1899, and the composite peal was rung by the Oxford Diocesan Guild on eight bells with 17,024 changes and lasted 11 hours and 12 minutes (ringing Double Norwich Court Bob Major), and they are heavy bells with a tenor of 21cwt. rung in the English style of full circle ringing. As an outsider I was impressed by the sheer difficulty and endurance of this feat by eight Englishmen over a hundred years ago. I was reminded of the fictional tale. How many years did this record for this composite method stand? How many more amazing feats like this are recorded on Peal Boards and sit unseen and uncelebrated in churches across England? *Margaret Marsh.*

(** Some research informed me the record was broken in 1904 at *South Wigston, Leics (8) (14cwt)*, with 17,104 changes in 10 hours 35 minutes, and in 1964 at *Llanfeugan, Powys (8) (12cwt)*, with 20,160 changes in 11 hours 6 minutes)
